Of course not! But I am going somewhere with this. Work is defined as our exertion or effort to accomplish something. There are a million ways to do work and a million different jobs, talents, skill sets — everybody has different things they do well. Your BFF may work in accounting. If you're married, your spouse may be a truck driver. Your neighbor may be a nurse, a gardener, a teacher, a cook, or a cashier. You may be a CPA, LPN, PhD, OR MD. Or you may be a homemaker and a homeschool mom. Everybody has a different job. Usually, we gravitate toward particular work based on our particular skills, talents, or interests.

What is the main reason people work?

Besides providing income, I think the main reason people work is that it gives them a place to do their thing – to do what they're passionate about, called to, enjoy, or skilled at. Sure, there are times we don't love our jobs, but we're grateful for the opportunity to contribute to supporting our families and serving others.

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Chances are what you wrote down reflects something about you. It likely reveals your one thing. You know, that thing you care about the most, what you're the best at, and most passionate about.

Well, in Haggai 2:4, the Jews had a chance to do their one thing. But their one thing finds its context and purpose in the main thing. Based on what you have

already learned about Haggai's prophecy, what was the main thing God was calling the Jews to do?

Does that remind you of anything you've read in the New Testament? Hmmm...

I found a few. First, Romans 12:4-5 declares two distinct truths that inform our one things.

4 For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office: 5So we, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another.

The point of your is to contribute to the You may think that what you do in the body of Christ is of little value. It may be behind the scenes where no one notices. But I promise, what you see as little — what the world may see as little — God sees as mighty. The church needs all of us doing what we're called to do to accomplish You may think it's no big deal, but to God and His church, it's a big deal!

You may need to hear with your heart what God said through Haggai: "Take courage and work; for I am with you" (2:4, NASB). Take courage. Be brave and do what God has called you to do. Take courage and do what God has designed you to do.

What is your one thing? Do you know? What is your spiritual gifting? What are your talents? What are you passionate about? Those things will help you know how God wired you to serve Him. Look back at that personal mission statement you wrote on page 16. It might help narrow your focus.

Take a moment to journal your thoughts or write out a prayer asking God to clarify this for you.

If you aren't sure what your one thing is, don't let that overwhelm you.

Walking with God on the path He leads you on is your most important one thing. So take courage, my friend, and take a step! Do your one thing in the big scheme of all things God is doing to accomplish His main thing in this world.

Be brave enough to be you and do what God is calling you to do! I'm cheering you on!
